Foreword

Established in 1999, KCOC has grown into a major trusted affiliation of over 140 civil society organizations (CSOs) in Korea. It is now widely recognized as the most credible representative of non-governmental platform for Korea's international development cooperation and humanitarian assistance.

Over the last two decades, KCOC and its member organizations have debated the proper trajectory of future development for Korean CSOs and pursued growth through partnership and solidarity.

The year 2020 was a global challenge due to COVID-19 pandemic. Yet paradoxically, COVID-19 pandemic accelerated the role of KCOC as a main platform of Korean NGOs in development cooperation.

In 2020, KCOC undertook two main activities in response to COVID-19 pandemic. Firstly, KCOC released [Korean NGOs Joint Statement on COVID-19 Response to urge Korean society to act together in fighting against COVID-19. Secondly, KCOC made a joint financial appeal for Korean NGOs' COVID-19 response, which is worth KRW 60 billion. Through the appeal, KCOC and Korean NGOs urged the government and private sector to act on COVID-19 response in developing countries. The members of KCOC spent KRW 40 billion for COVID-19 response programs in developing countries, including KRW 10 billion matching funds from the government.

Serving for 20 years as a national platform of Korean NGOs, KCOC now recommits itself to nurture and vitalize the ecosystem of international development cooperation so that Korean NGOs could strengthen their collective impact against global challenges such as COVID-19 pandemic and explore innovative solutions to tackle the challenges.

Along with my deepest gratitude to KCOC members and their four million supporters, I humbly ask you to continue to be part of our journey with your attention and encouragement.

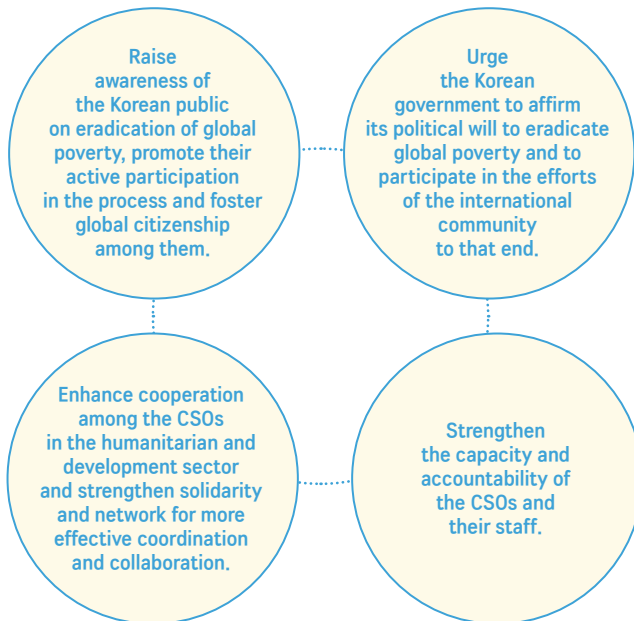

COVID-19 X KCOC

Release of Civil Society Position Paper in response to Covid 19 "Fight Against COVID-19 Global Pandemic" - April 8th

#Immediately

In March 2020, right after the COVID-19 Pandemic was declared, KCOC along with its partners and member organizations sought practical ways to respond to COVID-19 pandemic crisis.

Thematic workshops on COVID-19 response - April to May

KCOC provided COVID-19 related guidance and information by inviting humanitarian professionals working on the ground in a series of thematic webinars.

Release of KCOC's Appeal for overcoming COVID-19 - May 28th

From KCOC's 140 members, KCOC identified the financial need of KRW 60 billion for 170 COVID-19 emergency response projects targeting vulnerable populations in 64 countries. Through the appeal, KCOC made it clear that Korea development NGOs take a lead in the efforts to fight against COVID-19 pandemic and urged all development actors to collaborate in overcoming the pandemic.

COVID-19 Emergency Response

KCOC member organizations provided emergency support worth KRW 2.2 billion to the most vulnerable people at risk of COVID-19.

COVID-19 Communication - April to July

KCOC collected information and research materials regarding COVID-19 and shared them with Korea civil society.

In order to effectively respond to prolonged COVID-19 crisis, KCOC continued to share updates, information and collaborate with its members and partners.

Webinar on Global Funds COVID-19 Response - July 17th

Together with KAGH, GFAN Asia-Pacific, and Africa Future Foundation, KCOC co-organized a knowledge-sharing webinar on Global Funds COVID-19 response strategies and programs and explored the role of CSOs.

Youtube Interview: Voices from the fields - May to July

From May to July, KCOC conducted a series of online interviews with 17 field staff in 12 countries. The interviews were streamed through Youtube channel in order to share the live stories, news and updates from the fields on the government's COVID-19 response, medical capacity of the country, and the way life has changed before and during the COVID-19.

COVID-19 Country Situation Report (40 reports issued)

KCOC issued COVID-19 Country Situation Reports on a weekly basis for 11 months. The reports contained situation updates and trends of COVID-19 response by International Organizations, NGOs, and the governments of 11 countries.

Strengthening response capacity of infectious diseases – Assessment on healthcare facilities

- June to October

As the importance of response capacity of infectious disease such as COVID-19 increased, KCOC made a primary assessment on the level of healthcare facilities of the countries in which KCOC's member organizations operate.

A4SD (Action for Sustainable Development)* Participation in "Global Day of Solidarity" joint campaign

KCOC joined in signing on a joint position paper on COVID-19 global response signed by 725 civil society organizations world-wide. In addition to that, KCOC shared the activities by posting photos of "Global Day of Solidarity" and "StrongerTogether" campaigns online.

WFK NGO Volunteers COVID-19 Response Campaign: #Volunteering_At_Home

- May to July

KCOC initiated four online campaigns under the slogan "#volunteering_at_home" for the WFK's NGO Volunteers who were forced to return home due to COVID-19 pandemic. The aims of the campaigns were to encourage the volunteers to participate in the COVID-19 prevention and response activities and to enhance a sense of belonging to the communities while keeping their identity as WFK's NGO Volunteer.

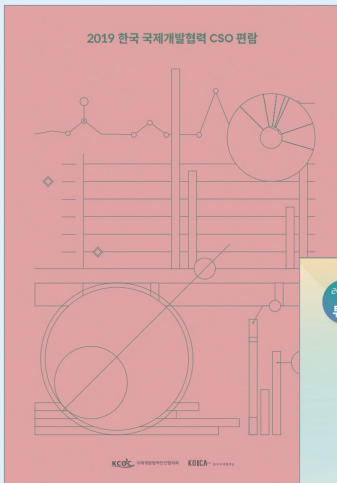

Aiming at fostering an environment for the NGOs and the staff to grow together to enhance accountability and transparency, KCOCC conducted various capacity building programs.

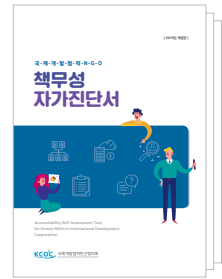

NGO Accountability Self-Check

KCOC published [NGO Accountability Self-Check] with an aim for its members to follow internationally-agreed principles in their day to day organizational management and program operation in a more transparent and accountable manner as guided by [NGO Code of Conduct]. The members are encouraged to participate in the self-check on an annual basis.

- March 16th ~ May 31st, 2020. 57 members participated.
- Self-Checklists consist of 80 questionnaires that are designed to diagnose the performance of NGOs in 5 main areas namely organization, program, finance, information disclosure, and NGO ethics.



Accountability training

KCOC conducted 6 workshops on accountability focusing on the importance of ensuring civil society accountability. During the workshop, participants reviewed national and international trends of accountability and safeguarding.

Establishing a database of Korea CSOs in the development and humanitarian sector

KCOC published Korea CSO statistics utilizing the established database of Korea CSOs working in the development and humanitarian sector. The database contributed to ensuring transparency and accountability of the CSOs as well as establishing a database of OECD DAC.

Finance & Accounting Training

Finance and Accounting Training was conducted targeting the staff in charge of finance and accounting in the non-profit sector. 54 participants from 42 organizations participated in the training.

External Audit Consultation

KCOC provided consulting services to the NGOs that never had been audited by external auditors. 5 NGOs were selected and were given 10 sessions of consulting services for free.

2020 Conference on Financial Transparency

KCOC hosted a conference on financial transparency in order to discuss the main policy change and the implications on the development sector.

KCOC actively engaged in various policy advocacy activities both at national and international level in order to contribute to policy change that affects the lives of people on the ground. In doing so, KCOC collected the voices from civil societies and partnered with multiple stake-holders and partners. KCOC provided a venue for all actors encompassing NGOs, academia, governments and the private sector to engage in discussions and education for global citizenship awareness-raising.

Policy Advocacy and Network

In close collaboration with its members, KCOC monitored national and international policies and also collected the voices of Korean development NGOs. KCOC endeavored to make influence on the policies and programs to reflect the voices of NGOs while putting an effort into strengthening the capacity of NGOs in policy advocacy.



Accountability Working Group

- Consisting of 10 NGOs, the Accountability Working Group worked together to draft "Guidelines for NGO Safeguarding".
- Working group members: Good Neighbors International, MIRAL Welfare Foundation, Save the Children Korea, Asia Women Bridge DoRunDoRun, Merry Year International, ChildFund Korea, Korea Food for the Hungry International, World Vision Korea, Holt Children's Services, Korean Disability Forum.

Promoting Child Rights and Protection Working Group

- The working group worked together to promote child rights and protection that affect ODA and NGOs' programs. In 2020, the working group published an English version of "Media Guideline for protection of child rights", and actively engaged in advocacy activities related to the UN Child Rights Convention (CRC).

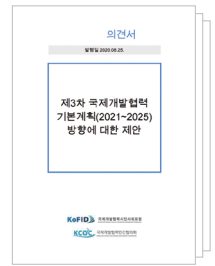

Policy Advocacy

Influence on the government policies

KCOC, together with KOFID and SIMINNETWORK actively engaged in the consultation process in developing an implementation plan of "Government-Civil Society Partnership Policy." Along the process, KCOC delivered NGOs' opinions on the 3rd International Development Cooperation Plan through organizing numerous public hearings and discussions at the National Assembly. Representing development NGOs, KCOC continued to deliver the voice of NGOs to improve the current partnership practices in regular consultation meetings.



NGOs' opinions on the 3rd International Development Cooperation Plan

Public-Private Partnership Regular Consultation Working Group

Playing as a main partner of KOICA-led [Public-Private Partnership Consultation], in which the main purpose is to draw overall regulations and guidelines of partnership in practice, KCOC ran an inclusive working group to gather various opinions from the civil society and set an agenda for discussion.

Organization of an online side-event during 2020 UN HLPF

KCOC, in close collaboration with Korea SDGs Network, submitted "2020 HLPF Korea NGOs Report"* during HLPF, which contained monitoring results of SDGs implementation progress from the perspectives of Korean NGOs. KCOC also organized an online side-event during HLPF in cooperation with KOICA and MOFA, in which the government and the NGOs discussed the roles of NGOs and the government and promoting partnership in times of COVID-19 crisis.

National and International Network and Solidarity

* In response to the UN's 2020 HLPF, Korean CSOs prepared the report to monitor the progress of SDGs implementation in Korea. The monitoring report is published on an annual basis by Korea SDGs Network. KCOC being a member of the network, joined in writing a chapter of 'ODA and Public-Private Partnership (SDG 17, 2/17, 16/17, 17) along with 5 members of KCOC (Good Neighbors International, ONHAPPY, KOVA, Taihwa Methodist Social Welfare Foundation, Holt Children's Services)

2020 Korea-Japan CSO Forum and G20 Summit Korea CSO Forum (Online forum)

- In July, KCOC co-hosted the 5th Korea-Japan CSO Forum to set up advocacy strategies from the perspectives of the vulnerable populations in response to COVID-19 from the SDG 16/17 point of view.
- KCOC, together with KOICA, Korea Public Diplomacy, and International Health Advocacy, co-hosted Civil 20 Korea CSO Policy Forum as part of the response to the G20 Summit in November.

Network with Forus

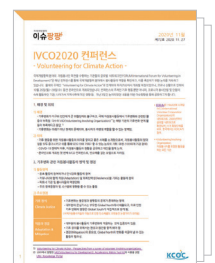
KCOC served as a board member of Forus, which is an international network of national platforms. KCOC contributed to strategy development and strengthening the capacity of Forus members.

Global Citizenship Education (GCED)

Global citizenship education aims to cultivate and enhance the skills, knowledge and attitude necessary to be global citizens. KCOC trains and dispatches instructors, develops textbooks, creates and expands platforms, and works with NGOs, schools, governmental authorities and individual instructors to that end.

Networking and Platform activities

NGO Network for GCED (year-round activity)

KCOC ran a platform for the NGOs engaged in GCED to exchange learning and cultivate cooperative culture among the NGOs. In 2020, 11 NGOs participated in the platform activities.

GCED workshop

In partnership with KOICA, KCOC organized a workshop to facilitate networking and exchange of information among current and aspiring practitioners of GCED. In the workshop, participants discussed the future direction of GCED in times of COVID-19 pandemic.

GCED Information Platform

KCOC published and distributed a booklet [Guidebook: GCED Programs], which provides overall program information and teaching tools of the 36 organizations that run GCED programs. KCOC also compiled a list of 200+ GCED references.

KCOC, in partnership with KOICA, dispatches WFK NGO Volunteer Corps to the operational fields of development and humanitarian NGOs across the globe. Ever since the first batch of 33 volunteers were dispatched in 2004, over 3,600 volunteers have contributed to achieving the SDGs by serving in the fields with their knowledge, skills, and abilities in their chosen areas of specialty.

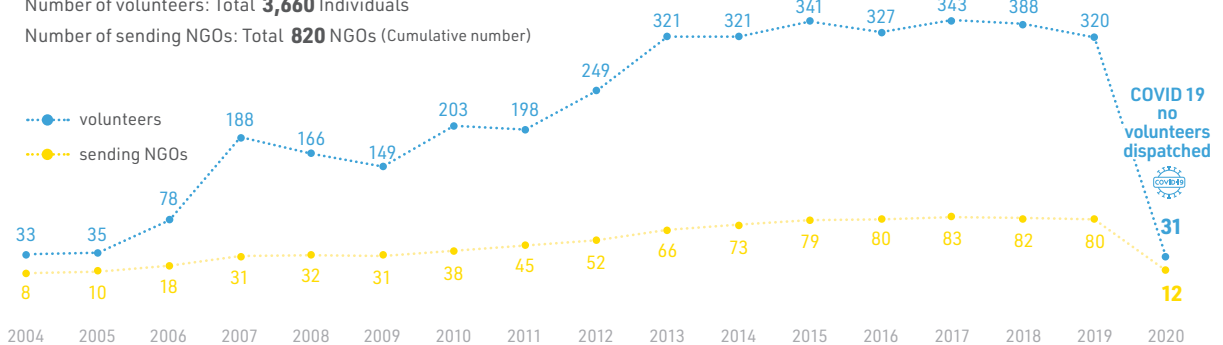

WFK NGO Volunteers Statistics (2004-2020)

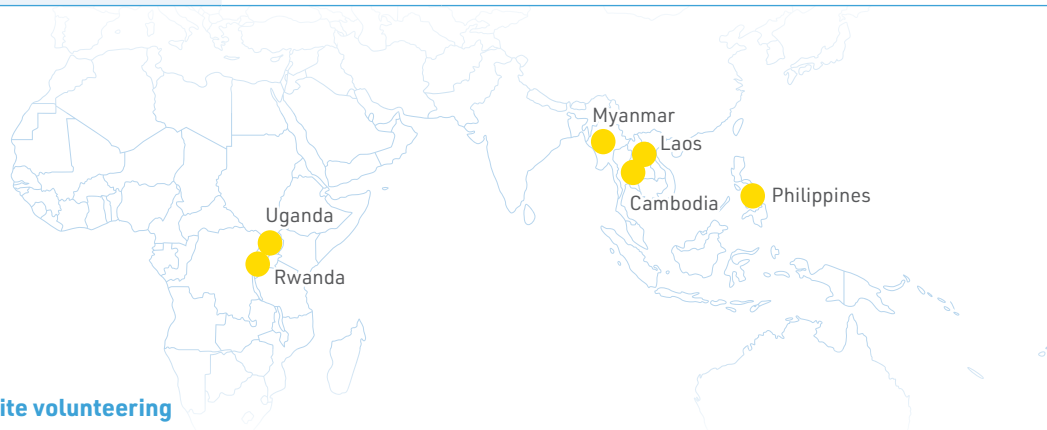

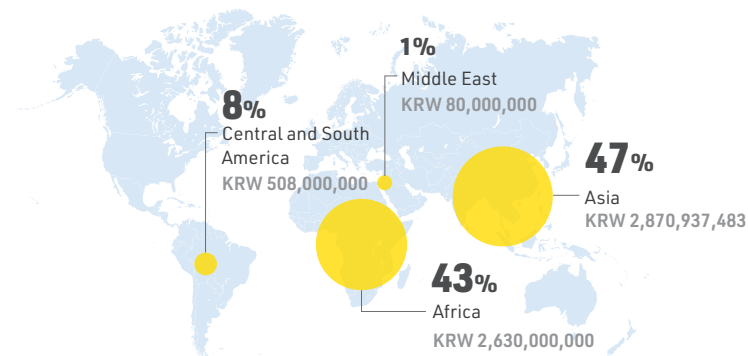

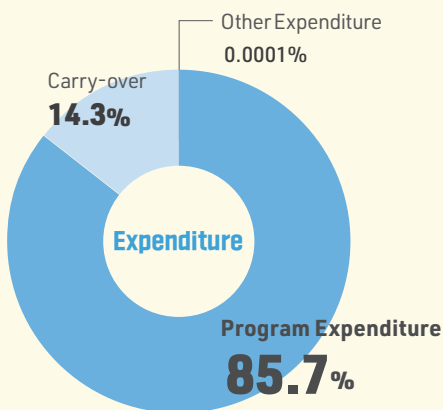
